During last year the Rev. Keith Smith retired from Council. He was Chairman of Council and Vice President, but due to pressure of other work he had to resign. We were indeed sad. Mr. Smith worked hard and we are most grateful to him for all the help he gave us in the development and expansion of our Association.



ANNUAL REPORT 1974/75

This report covers the period from January 1974 to June 1975, because the financial year of the Association has been changed, and is now from July 1st - June 30th.

During this time there has been a great expansion of all the services provided and the headquarters have moved from Unley to Kensington where the Association now has its own premises.

The Government of South Australia provided special funds early in 1974, and two adjoining properties were purchased, one being used for the clinic services and the other housing the administration staff. These new premises were opened by the Premier, Mr. Dunstan, in October 1974.



STAFF

In spite of the growth of the Association during the last financial year, the administrative staff has been increased by only one half-time person. In the clinics, the nursing staff was increased by one full-time sister and five members of the sessional staff have been appointed on a half-time basis. We now have one doctor who works half time, but the rest of the medical staff continue on a sessional basis. In education the staff has increased by one half-time person.

TRAINING

Family Planning training, from both the clinical and community education aspects, has been provided for medical practitioners, nurses, and for health and welfare personnel working in the community.

There have been five training courses for nurses, and 102 have completed their training. Besides nurses from our own clinics, staff have been trained from hospitals, the Health Department and Mothers and Babies' Health Association.

Ten doctors have completed their training during the financial year and all have worked in the clinics.

In education there is a continuing in-service programme, and six new educators have been trained.

Dr. Malcolm Potts, Medical Consultant to International Planned Parenthood Federation gave a Public Lecture in August, 1974, and there have been four seminars arranged by the Family Planning Association during the year. These were conducted in association with the State Co-ordinating Committee for education in Family Planning and attended by our own medical and education staff and by many people from outside the organization.

In October 1974 a Workshop for Senior Instructing Nurses from all State Family Planning Associations was held at our premises at Unley and there were 18 participants. Miss Wilma Schiner, from the Kapiolani Hospital in Honolulu was the guest speaker.

A three day in-service training course was held in March 1975 for the Nurse Educators from the country areas, and nurses from the Health Department who are working in community education also attended.


CLINICS

Until October 1974 the clinics at Unley were running at full capacity four days and five evenings each week. When the new building was opened at Kensington in October, the daytime sessions were transferred there, and gradually evening sessions were added. It quickly became apparent that patients preferred to attend the Headquarters clinic, so sessions were increased at Kensington replacing some of those at Unley.

Early in 1974 the Association began Pregnancy Counselling clinics. These clinics are staffed by a doctor, sister and social worker, and since February 1975 the pregnancy tests have been done in the clinic.

Suburban clinics are held regularly at Elizabeth, Seacombe Gardens, St. Agnes, Mansfield Park, Pt. Adelaide and the Adelaide Children's Hospital. The domiciliary nursing service has expanded rapidly and the work of the two sisters has greatly increased and it is planned that this work will be extended as soon as funds are available.

Changes have been made in the duties of the social workers, and instead of all new patients talking with them, they now see patients only by referrals from our own doctors and sisters, or from other agencies.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The last Treasurer's Report covered the period 1st January-31st December 1973 and at the last Annual General Meeting the financial year of the Association was changed to 1st July to 30th June. The detailed statement shows only this latter period but the first six months of 1974 were audited separately and incorporated with the 1973 figures. These are shown on the left-hand side of the statement.

This statement speaks for itself and shows how all receipts and payments have dramatically increased.

The continued generous support from the State Government particularly the special grant of \$85,782 early in 1974 for the purchase of our new headquarters, should be noted. This financial year, our grant from the State Government was \$90,000 an increase of \$20,000, and in common with other similar organizations, we were urged to curb expansion and consolidate our services. It was however not possible to stop the increase in the numbers of people seeking both clinic advice and education programmes.

Our share of the Australian Government grant paid through the Australian Federation of Family Planning Associations was also increased.

The move to our new headquarters accounted for the high establishment costs and although inflation was a factor, the increase in all our activities is reflected in the figures.

EDUCATION/INFORMATION

The mobile unit has continued to be used in providing information services. It is manned by voluntary educators, mainly at suburban shopping centres. A free-standing display board is used in suburban and city areas and leaflets and posters are on display in a large number of health and welfare agencies.

Education programmes have increased due to the demands from the community. Programmes have been conducted with parent groups, community groups, and tertiary students in the health, welfare and education fields.

Education programmes in high schools have increased dramatically 1974 - 18 schools 1975 - 33 schools have invited family planning staff to speak to their students.

The volunteer community educators have continued to make a

major contribution in the Association's work in education and information.

The Senior Supervisory Sister conducts a series of lectures for nurses and midwives in training hospitals, and constant in-service programmes have been offered to staff and volunteers.

COUNTRY SERVICES

The country clinics at Whyalla, Pt. Pirie and Pt. Augusta were not successful and they have been replaced by a nurse/educator service. This is similar to the services provided during 1974 in Mt. Gambier, Pt. Lincoln, and the Riverland, and these have proved satisfactory. Trained nurses are employed in all these centres to conduct information/education programmes in the community and in schools. They counsel and advise on matters relating to birth control and they work in co-operation with local doctors, schools, and community health and welfare personnel.

SUMMARY

The period of 18 months that this report covers has been exciting and stimulating to all those involved in the work of the Association. We have acquired our own premises and many new ideas have been put into practice. There has been considerable expansion in all fields, reflecting community demands, despite the financial stringency. The Association has grown in 5 years from a small service providing 2 clinic sessions a week, to a large professional organization, employing a staff of 78 and handling a budget of \$250,000.

The Council is well aware of the loyalty and effort of the full-time staff and sessional and voluntary workers, for they have been responsible for building the Association into the efficient organization that it has become.
